The CCAC was officially created with a mission 'to work with communities today to lessen the impact of cancer tomorrow!' Community priorities were established.

The CCAC hosted its first in-person retreat and saw over 70 (with COVID

CCAC input informed the establishment of Community **Advisory Boards** (CABs) to provide community voice to research projects with specific population focus.

CCAC continued to strengthen and expand community partnerships to further the mission into underrepresented communities, while also playing a key 2023-2028 Strategic Plan development.

CCAC is a community-led group that acts as the primary community advisory board for Wilmot and is the cornerstone of community engagement efforts undertaken throughout Wilmot. The CCAC is highly integrated into all of COE's aims and Wilmot's activities, identifying high-priority research, outreach, and education initiatives; leading health improvement projects; organizing an annual retreat and Community Conversations on Cancer to engage and educate community partners and Wilmot members; and incorporating in Wilmot's strategic planning implementation and leadership committees.

- is highly integrated into all of COE's aims and Wilmot's activities;
- identifies high-priority research, outreach, and education initiatives;
- leads health improvement projects;

CCAC WORKING GROUPS

Community Driven Cancer Research (CDCR)

FOCUS: To foster equitable participation in cancer research and to diversify the cancer research workforce

Our Voice Your Science Research Project

Survivors and caregivers worked together with Wilmot staff to create an RFA, calling for applications to fund research directly relevant to needs of our community. They reviewed all applicants and funded two projects: 'Impact of a Whole Food, Plant-based Diet on Breast Cancer and 'Expanding Reach in our Catchment Area with Self-administered Remote Blood Collection: a Feasibility Study with Preliminary Validation.

Youth Pipeline

In partnership with Black Men Achieve and Encompass, CDCR created an interactive presentation on cancer research careers. The group presented to over 30 high school students from underrepresented backgrounds, sparking interest, and providing direction on how to become involved.

Clinical Trials Video

Using information obtained from focus groups and interviews, CDCR worked with Dr. Paul Barr and WCl Marketing to film a video showcasing a clinical trials participant and his provider. The video focused on addressing myths in clinical trials and was made accessible with ASL interpretation, and closed captioning in both English and Spanish. This informational video has reached over 72,000 people through social media.

Cancer Prevention and Risk Reduction

FOCUS: To educate communities about ways to reduce personal risks for cancer and to increase cancer screening rates.

Community Cooking Demo

Hosted at Cameron Ministries, this working group collaborated with chef Philomena Emeku-lheukwu to show community members how to make a healthy, nutritious meal with cancer prevention benefits. A Wilmot nutritionist provided information on health benefits. At the end of the demonstration, ingredients were given to all participants.

Faith-Based Community Cancer Symposium

Since 2023, Cancer Symposiums have been held at Mt. Olivet Baptist Church and Greater Harvest Church as a product of collaboration between Wilmot and various faith-based organizations in the city of Rochester. This event educated over 80 individuals! At the event, providers talked about different types of cancer, including: prostate, colorectal, breast, and prostate; screening recommendations, and ongoing research. Yoga and meditation were offered on-site, and community partners provided information on their resources.

Lung Cancer Screening Telephone Town Hall

A patient navigator from the Lung Cancer Screening Program educated community members through a telephone town hall about the requirements for lung cancer screening and what happens during a screening. This interactive and educational opportunity saw over 750 participants!

Access to Care/Rural Integration

FOCUS: To improve cancer care throughout the region by increasing access to health interventions and research.

Community Survey

Access surveyed library patrons and staff throughout the region to identify telehealth capacity and perspectives on telehealth services. 115 people responded and results indicated that there was high interest in developing a community telehealth hub at a local library.

Community Informed Research

Access has partnered with Dr. Maria McGreevey in research! Partnering with community members, focus groups have been created in rural areas to determine the usefulness of a chatbot to determine if hereditary cancer screening is right for individuals.

Telehealth Hub Promotion

Working with libraries in Macedon, Ovid, and Watkins Glen, the group has hosted events to spotlight telehealth options in local locations and to provide information on the uses of telehealth. Working in collaboration with researchers and providers





Cancer Survivorship and Caregiver Resources

FOCUS: To provide the assistance and resources needed to support individuals going through treatment, survivorship, or caregiving.

Survivorship Resource Map

Working with the Wilmot Marketing Team, Survivorship compiled information on the region, created a map and resource listing, and posted the map on the Wilmot website for community members to use. Resources can be searched by county or by category, including: communication and language, financial, end of life care, support groups, and transportation. Organizations can be added to the map, and currently over 100 organizations are listed!

Peer Mentors

Recognizing the need for additional supports at diagnosis for both survivors and caregivers, Survivorship collaborated to create an equitable, appropriate, community friendly program to link current patients/ caregivers with cancer survivors/former caregivers to answer questions, connect to resources, and provide emotional support.





Risk Factors, Behaviors, and Screening in our Catchment Area

Low HPV vaccination rates

Smoking rates are 16.9%, compared to 11.1% for NYS and 14,2% for the US.

High rates of obesity (33%)

Tools We Use

Cancer Visual Analytic System (CANVAS) is web-based mapping tool designed to combine Wilmot patient data with external data sources. CANVAS offers the ability to compare multiple maps with different data points side by side. CANVAS is available to Wilmot members through Wilmot's informatics team.

New Cancer InFocus is an publicly-available data mapping tool that allows researchers and community members to explore cancer-relevant data variables (including social determinants of health) through interactive maps and downloaded able datasets.

COE OUTREACH HIGHLIGHTS

Being present in the community is much more than words.

COE works strategically to disseminate evidence-based cancer prevention and control initiatives and inform policy, with the goal of reducing the cancer burden and promoting equity across our catchment area. We hear the testimonies and voices of our community partners, leaders and citizens. This information helps drive Wilmot's priorities, resources, and outreach.



Collaboration Spotlight

Engagement of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Community

COE and CCAC have identified enhancing engagement of the Deaf community as an urgent priority.

Needs Assessment of the Deaf Community in Rochester

 Collaboration between COE and Innivee Strategies to survey 118 Deaf and HoH individuals, providing valuable insight into this community's current needs.

Recruitment of Deaf Health Professionals

 In response to community recommendations, the DEI office is implementing specific strategies to support hiring more Deaf faculty and staff.

Wilmot Future Deaf Scientists Internship Program

Collaboration between CRTEC and the Rochester School for the Deaf (RSD). Now in its 4th year, this innovative summer internship program sees Deaf high school students spending four weeks at Wilmot, gaining insights into careers in translational cancer research and clinical care. Wilmot received additional funding from the National Cancer Institute in 2024 to expand the summer internship to a complete two-year academic program and to include four additional sites across the U.S.

ENGAGING THE COMMUNITY IN RESEARCH

Cancer Prevention and Control (CPC)

Supriya Mohile, MD, MS & Karen Mustian, PhD, MPH Researchers in Cancer Prevention and Control (CPC) work

alongside patients, survivors, and caregivers to develop effective interventions for reducing cancer risk as well as develop supportive care therapies that reduce lingering effects of cancer and its treatments. Current focuses include behavior change through interventions (e.g. tobacco control, screening, and exercise), aging, and diversity.



CPC Liaison Highlight: Dr. Scott McIntosh studies technology-assisted and self-help interventions for risk behavior change. He has worked with other CPC members and Wilmot's COE team to evaluate and share community-engaged interventions for tobacco cessation in communities with high smoking rates. Additionally, he is working closely with CCAC members to elevate research on emerging community priorities, such as helping people quit vaping.

Cancer Microenvironment (CM)

Laura Calvi, MD & Minsoo Kim, PhD
Researchers in Cancer Microenvironment aim on improving cancer treatment methods through utilizing their research on cell manipulation. Current focuses include developing methods of disrupting cancer-cell promoting micro-environments, reprogramming immunosuppressive responses, and mitigating tissue injury due to cancer treatment.

CM Liaison Highlight: Dr. Benjamin Frisch's esearch is focused on changes of the bone marrow microenvironment caused by myeloid malignancies, with the goal of translating this research for clinical use. He has a specific interest in outreach to rural and Mennonite communities, and with his support, CM members have engaged rural and older adult hematologic cancer patients/survivors via a Community Advisory Board

convened by Wilmot's COE Office in new research happening in his program.





Genetics, Epigenetics & Metabolism (GEM)

Paula Vertino, PhD & Darren Carpizo, MD, PhD Genetics, Epigenetics, and Metabolism (GEM) is a laboratory-based research program that aims to better our understanding of cellular factors that drive cancer development. Current focuses include genetic and epigenetic factors effecting cancer cell plasticity, aging's effect on vulnerabilities to cancer, and exploiting vulnerabilities brought about by oxidative stress and metabolic re-programming.

GEM Liaison Highlight: Dr. Isaac Harris's research focuses on uncovering the various roles of antioxidants in cancer by using pre-clinical approaches (i.e., using cancer cells in a dish or animal models). In 2023, he was awarded COE Pilot funding to look at the impact of a whole-food, plant-based diet on patients with metastatic breast cancer. He is partnering with the Faith in Community Advisory Board to guide this research, help disseminate study results, and lay the foundation for future clinical trials.



Stage 4 Melanoma Survivor Personal Trainer CRI ImmunoAdvocate

In 2004, at the age of 22, Sharon Belvin was diagnosed with stage 4 melanoma. After trying nearly all cancer treatments and experiencing severe side effects, Sharon was almost out of options. After talking with her oncologist, Sharon joined a clinical trial testing a new type of cancer treatment called checkpoint blockade immunotherapy. One year later, after four rounds of treatment, Sharon was cancer free. She now dedicates herself to helping others become as healthy as possible and sharing her story to inspire others in their fight against cancer.








COE Innovator Award
