

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

The American College of Dentists confers Fellowship on selected persons to recognize meritorious achievements and potentials for contributions in dental science, art, education, literature, human relations and other areas of human welfare. The College works to promote the highest ideals in health care, to advance the standards and efficiency of dentistry and to extend the benefits of dental health to the greatest number.

Grants and Contracts

I am very pleased to be able to report that the Center has recently received a number of significant contracts and grants.

The Department of Caries Research has received a \$438,000 two-year contract from the National Institute of Dental Research to determine the cariogenicity of 36 snack foods. The Environmental Protection Agency has approved a one-year \$44,000 grant to study barium in teeth. As a sign of the times, funding is pending approval of the Office of Management and Budget. The FMC Corporation has awarded the department a \$14,600 contract to test antiplaque agents.

The Department of General Dentistry has received a fiveyear \$190,000 Geriatric Dentistry Academic Award from the National Institute on Aging, and a four-year \$93,000 contract from Corning Glass Works for the clinical evaluation of a castable glass ceramic material.

Features on the research will appear in future issues of MOMENTUM.

AT HOME ABROAD

Bryant W. Rossiter is president of EDC's Board of Trustees. As director of the Chemistry Division of Eastman Kodak Research Laboratories, he is a frequent traveler. He was in Europe last summer and paid a visit to the Institut Dentaire George Eastman, EDC's Belgian counterpart.

Dr. Rossiter says the institute, "an elegant three-story building, is located in Parc Leopold in a fashionable section of Brussels. It was patterned after the old Center on Main Street East, but is more opulent."

Dr. Michel Pourtois, its present director, is a "personable, distinguished dentist who is very much interested in many aspects of dental research, including dental materials, immunology and lead contamination in children's teeth from substances like paint and gas." He is also concerned with dental hygiene and the effects of strontium on enamel.

Today, three-quarters of the building is used for dentistry; the remaining quarter, as a home for the aged. The institute mainly provides clinical care and currently records 20,000 patient visits per year, most of them by children. Several times a week busloads of children come to the clinic for treatment. Only then is the institute fully operational. Dr. Pourtois foresees the day when the number of patient visits will triple and the entire building again be devoted to dentistry.

There is socialized dentistry in Belgium, but most private practitioners charge additional fees.

Perhaps the clinic's most illustrious adult patients are the royal family. Belgium's monarchs have taken an active in-

terest in the institution since its beginning.

In the summer of 1931, the Belgian ambassador to the United States at the request of the municipal authorities of Brussels wrote to George Eastman and suggested he might be interested in establishing a clinic there. A contract was signed in October 1931 and the foundation stone laid two years later. Queen Elisabeth, consort of King Albert, and a distinguished company of governmental dignitaries officiated at the ceremony.

The Brussels clinic was dedicated on July 31, 1935. King Leopold III, who assumed the throne on his father's death, and Queen Astrid, his wife, presided at the function. Dr. Harvey J. Burkhart, EDC's first director, on behalf of the executors of George Eastman's will, formally presented the clinic to the municipal authorities.

The institute is now one of the larger of seven divisions of the Free University of Brussels. Its staff includes four full-time people and 32 who come in on a part-time basis. The institute does not grant advanced degrees, but does confer certificates upon students who complete orthodontic specialty training.

Fortunately, it survived the political tensions that were rife in the 70s between the Dutch-speaking Flemings of Belgium's north and the French-speaking Walloons of the south.

As Bryant Rossiter took his leave, Dr. Pourtois asked him to extend greetings to Dr. William D. McHugh and all of EDC's staff.

IN MEMORIAM

ELMER PAMMENTER died on July 29 at the age of 87 of complications of a stroke.

Dr. Pammenter, a member of the first class of interns of the Rochester Dental Dispensary, was chief of clinic and oral surgery from 1920 to 1958. His influence was international. He instructed clinic directors at the Eastman Dental Centers in Rome, Paris, Brussels, Stockholm and London.

He maintained an office as long as EDC remained on Main Street East.

Dr. William McHugh said of Elmer Pammenter, "He was a pioneer in children's dentistry and had a profound effect on the development of the profession. We have lost a very fine man."

ROBERT W. BAKER, senior clinical associate in the Department of Orthodontics, was recently elected president of the Edward H. Angle Society of Orthodontists.

Dr. Baker commutes to EDC to teach from Ithaca, New York, where he is a practicing orthodontist.

The Angle Society, an international organization, is com-

After Isaac Mayer received his Ph.D. from Hebrew University in 1960, his first postdoctoral appointment was as



a research fellow in the Department of Chemistry at Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute. He later was a research associate with the ADA group at the National Bureau of Standards in Washington, D.C.

Dr. Mayer's area of research interest is in fluorides and hydroxyapatites. He says, "Not too many biologic systems are connected with inorganic chemistry, but apatite is. I am interested in investigating a biologically related field of inorganic chemistry."

Working at Eastman Dental Center in a Department of Caries Research laboratory has given Dr. Mayer the opportunity to see what other people in similar fields are doing and to discuss ideas of mutual interest. Like all creative scientists, he is stimulated by new ideas and finds that the exchange of views invigorates his own work. He enjoys "the work, the spirit of cooperation of the good scientists, the

good laboratories and the atmosphere of the Center."

Although as associate professor in Hebrew University's Department of Inorganic and Analytical Chemistry, he is a member of the science faculty, he often supervises the graduates of the university's Hadassah Dental School who are working towards Master's degrees.

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
