Yes, it's finally true! As of July 1, we entered a new era in our 82-year history. As a division of the University of Rochester Medical Center, we have a new name and identity, "University of Rochester Eastman Dental Center."

The Center and URMC celebrated the affiliation on July 28. An afternoon event brought together more than 100 friends and colleagues from both institutions. Dr. Lowell Goldsmith, Dean of the School of Medicine & Dentistry, welcomed EDC into the Medical Center family.

That same evening we celebrated with senior leadership of both institutions as well as members of the URMC and former EDC Boards. Participating in the ceremony were University of Rochester President Thomas Jackson, Senior Vice President and Vice Provost for Health Affairs Dr. Jay Stein,

URMC Board Chairman and UR Trustee Ronald Knight, former EDC Board President Dr. Wilfred Springer, and myself.

EDC has joined the University of Rochester Medical Center as a peer organization with Strong Memorial Hospital, the School of Medicine and Dentistry, the School of Nursing, and the UR Medical Faculty Group. EDC's endowment is in a separate foundation, preserved exclusively for the advancement of oral health.

Over the next 12 months, we will define our partnership with URMC and its School of Medicine and Dentistry. In light of the affiliation plan, the collective entity will: expand dental education, research, and clinical capabilities; respond to and withstand reductions in research and education funding; and link clinical services with the dental community to advance oral health and succeed under managed care. I will keep you closely informed of our plans as we move forward.

Meanwhile, life at the Center goes on. We have enjoyed a productive year and in this issue, you'll read about our accomplishments and initiatives over the past few months. From our successful



SMILEMOBILE I TRAVELS TO CORNING, NEW YORK

trip to EDC's

Smilemobile is an adventure for children. From the wigglebug (a toothbrush) to Mr. Bumpy (the drill), staff at the Smilemobile help children view trips to the dentist and their own oral health care in a positive way.

With the help of our Smilemobile program, Medicaid-eligible schoolage children from the greater Corning area received much-needed dental care this summer and learned how the dentist can be a friend for life.

This effort, launched in partnership with Corning Hospital/Founders Pavilion, University of Rochester Eastman Dental Center, and Steuben County Social Services, was a success in its first year, Eastman Dental Center's Smilemobile I, a fully-equipped mobile

dental unit, parked in the former Texaco lot of Corning Hospital/Founders Pavilion and provided care to children for three-days a week, from early July through the end of August.

Medicaid-eligible children, enrolled by Steuben County Social Services, received basic dental care, including examinations, cleanings, fluoride treatments, sealants, and fillings. Appointments were scheduled by Steuben County Social Services; the agency also provided transportation for those children needing transport to and from the Smilemobile.

An Interview with Patient Services Manager Jane Devries


ow are patients

responding to the changes in the waiting area?

"We've had an excellent response from patients regarding improvements in the atrium reception area and the streamlined processing system. In June, the atrium was redesigned to include a three-sided reception desk and a new patient waiting area complete with carpeting. The design allows patients to be served by one of the three representatives, providing for a better utilization of space and a smoother traffic flow. The stations help patients spend less time waiting in line.

You've really concentrated on improving phone service. What results have you observed?

Since the system started 18 months ago, we've focused on monitoring our response time to incoming calls. Last December we handled 262 calls and the average time it took to answer a call was 88 seconds. In June, 271 calls were answered and the average time for answering a call was only 20 seconds. This proves that a combination of training and determination certainly pays off.



Our patient service representatives (PSR's) are public relations ambassadors for the Center. Whether answering the phone or greeting patients, they set a tone and leave an impression. Although it's a stressful job, we have a good mix of people who continuously work at developing their skills. We've focused on cross-training within the office and have held sessions to help our PSR's develop an awareness of the social and economic issues that face many of our patients. This understanding helps us maintain positive relationships with our patients.

What are EDC's future plans for patient services?

We need to take the next step and work with our patients so they're aware of the financial options that are available to them. We are exploring the addition of a patient coordinator position within the next six months to help patients develop such payment plans. Our area is continually changing because every day brings new opportunities for improvement. We work as a team and look for ways to do a better job.

Beecham donated


1,000 toothbrushes and tubes of toothpaste to the Smilemobile.





Berkowitz, professor and pediatric dentistry program director, has been re-appointed to a third term as chief of the Division of Pediatric Dentistry in the Department of Dentistry and Pediatrics of the URMC School of Medicine and Dentistry.

Dr. Jack Caton, professor, associate director for educational affairs, and periodontology program director, was elected vice president of the American Academy of Periodontology at its annual meeting in San Diego, CA. His term began on October 7, 1997. In addition, Dr. Caton (Perio '73) and Dr. Timothy Blieden (Perio '91) have received a two-year research contract in the amount of \$90,500 from BIORA, Inc.

Dr. Gerald Graser, professor and prosthodontics program director, acted as moderator of the 27th Annual Meeting of the American College of Prosthodontics in October. Dr. Graser, president of the American Academy of Osseointegration, will represent the Academy at the Nobel Biocare's International Team Day in November. Drs. Gerald Graser (Prostho '72) and Carlo Ercoli (Prostho '96, TMJ '97) received a \$100,000 commercial grant from Steri-oss to study the effects of bacterial penetration on dental implant components.

Dr. Stanley Handelman, professor emeritus and former chair of the general dentistry department, received an award from the American Association of Dental School's (AADS) for advancing general dentistry in the United States. Dr. Hans Malmström, associate professor and general dentistry program director, received a grant from Bayer Corporation in the amount of \$33,000 to evaluate the efficacy and safety of two pain medications following periodontal flap surgery. Dr. Malmström has been elected secretary of the AADS section for post-graduate general dentistry.

Dr. Andre Mol, assistant professor in the general dentistry and oral sciences programs, (Gen Dent '95) is participating in three multi-center clinical trials to evaluate the efficacy of new drugs in preserving alveolar bone and promote periodontal healing. Dr. Mol oversees clinical radiography and conducts image analysis using digital subtraction radiography.

Dr. Mark Moss, assistant professor, oral science program, was awarded \$27,828 for his role as co-investigator of a one-year National Institute of Environmental Health study. Dr. J. Campbell, principal investigator, is a faculty member in the pediatric department of the URMC School of Medicine & Dentistry.

Ms. Sheila Mundorff-Shrestha, associate professor, oral sciences, received funding in the amount of \$98,500 for three studies to assess the anticaries efficacy of new dentifrice products.

Ms. Mundorff-Shrestha presented Improved Scoring System for Evaluation of Cariostatic Products in the Rat Model in May to The Task Force on Design and Analysis, Inc. in Newark, New Jersey. Co-authors were Drs.

Buddhi Shrestha and Howard Proskin.

Dr. Robert E. Rosenblum, associate professor, orthodontic program, (Ortho '59) received the Edward H. Angle Research Prize at the 32nd biennial meeting of the Edward H. Angle Society of Orthodontists for his manuscript, "Class II Malocclusion: Mandibular Retrusion or Maxillary Protrusion?"


Dr. Buddhi Shrestha, program director, community dentistry program, (Ped Dent '70) was appointed to the New York State Department of Health's New York State Medical Managed Care Work Group in Albany, New York. Dr. Shrestha was also appointed to the New York State Department of Health Bureau of Dental Health's Strategic Plan Committee.

Dr. James Soltys, assistant professor, prosthodontics program, (Gen Dent '82, Prostho '94) recently became a diplomate of the American Academy of Prosthodontics.

Dr. Darlene Riggins White, a clinical instructor in the community dentistry program, (Gen Dent '78) has been elected to a three-year term on the board of directors of the American Red Cross.

Dr. Domenick Zero, professor, associate director for research and oral sciences program director, (Gen Dent '77) has received five contracts for over \$538,000 to study the efficacy of new products for the prevention of dental caries. Dr. Zero also received two federal grants; one in the amount of \$204,390 from the Health Resources and Services Administration and a Small Business Research Grant in the amount of \$62,500. In addition, Dr. Zero is cariology group program chair for the March AADR and June IADR meetings in 1998.

HELP FOR CHEYENNE

Daugherty was born nearly three months premature. Delivered before her lungs were fully formed, she spent six and a half months in the neonatal intensive care unit at Strong Memorial Hospital. Born in June, Cheyenne didn't go home to her parent's house until January.

Cheyenne got her first tooth at 10 months. Her mother, Gretchen, recognized that Cheyenne had inherited amelogenesis imperfecta, a genetic condition that results in the formation of teeth with defective enamel. Her inherited enamel defect resulted in dental decay of her entire dentition. By the time she came to Eastman Dental Center at 26 months of age, Cheyenne needed eight teeth crowned and eight more extracted.

"Cheyenne's teeth had deteriorated significantly by the time I examined her," says Robert J. Berkowitz, D.D.S., pediatric dentistry program director. Complicating matters, Cheyenne's lungs were still weak, making the use of general anesthesia a delicate matter. Working with the pediatric intensive care team and

pediatric anesthesia service at Strong Memorial Hospital, Dr. Berkowitz extracted and capped Cheyenne's teeth without complication. "The surgery went well," reported Cheyenne's mother, Mrs. Gretchen Daugherty. "Cheyenne was sore the first night but she healed up nicely."

The Daugherty family's involvement with EDC is just beginning. Cheyenne is a triplet. Her sister, Sage, also has amelogenesis imperfecta. Brother Dalton was born with normal enamel but has other problems associated with premature birth that have resulted in extensive dental decay. Both Sage and Dalton will undergo dental surgery.

Robert J. Berkowitz, D.D.S., is professor and director of the pediatric dentistry program at Eastman Dental Center. He is also chief of the Division of Pediatric Dentistry in the Departments of Clinical Dentistry and Pediatrics of the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry.



He has taken advantage of his dual role, bringing together experts from both institutions to treat children with special medical problems and developmental disabilities that need dental care. "This is an example of the synergy that can be achieved when two institutions work together for the betterment of children's health," says Dr. Berkowitz.

Dr. Berkowitz is an internationally recognized expert in the management of dental problems for children who have significant medical problems. He earned his dental degree at SUNY Buffalo, completed a residency in pediatric dentistry at Children's Hospital Medical Center in Boston, and a post-doctoral fellowship in microbiology at Forsyth Dental Center, also in Boston.

Dr. Berkowitz was recruited by Eastman Dental Center in 1992 from the Children's National Medical Center in Washington, D.C. where he served

as associate chair of the
Department of Pediatric
Dentistry. During this
period, he also served
as professor of pediatrics of the George
Washington
University
School of
Medicine.

Over 400 people visited News Source 13's Family Health Check at Marketplace Mall. The Center joined 100 health care organizations to




promote health and

successfully met or exceeded all standards of the Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA) and will be reaccredited in 1998.

The accreditation process involved an extensive self-study for each program and for the institution.

Compliance was evaluated by a site visit team. The site visit took place on May 13 and 14. A consultant, assigned to each program, determined whether the program and institution met CODA guidelines for accreditation. Exit interviews were conducted with each program director and with the director and associate directors.

In the analysis provided by the consultants, many areas throughout the Center received positive commendations. No significant recommendations were made by the site visit team for correction. All areas evaluated by the consultants substantially met, or exceeded, the standards set by CODA.


