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Traci Terrance, PhD, Leads Department Anti-Racism Efforts

Traci Terrance, PhD, LCSW, Senior Instructor in the Departments of Psychiatry and Family Medicine, is serving as faculty leader who is coordinating the Equity and Anti-Racism efforts in the Department of Family Medicine. She is a member of the Anti-Racism Change Team (ACT) and will continue as a member and leader of this important group as well as part of the URM Office of Equity & Inclusion.

Dr. Terrance has been a clinician with the Behavioral Health Services team within the Highland Family Medicine practice for three years and has been teaching Family Medicine residents psychosocial topics as part of their core curriculum.

Dr. Terrance earned her Bachelor's in Social Work from Nazareth College and her Master's in Social Work from Syracuse University.

She is a licensed clinical social worker with 20 years of experience in social work and community mental health practice.

In June 2021, she earned her PhD in Human Development from the University of Rochester Warner School of Education, defending her dissertation titled, *"Grappling with Race, Power, and Privilege: Experiences of Critical Self-Reflection and Cultural Humility Among Counseling Trainees."*

The Antiracism Change Team (ACT), is working in partnership with the URM's Office of Strategic Communications, on an environmental assessment, including a departmental survey and listening sessions (focus groups), and a plan is being developed that will support the department in articulating and operationalizing both short and long-term goals related to

I am proud of the efforts of the Department of Family Medicine as we work toward Equity and Anti-Racism in our country.

CLINICAL SERVICE.

The Highland Family Medicine (HFM) practice continues to serve a diverse mix of individuals and families in Rochester and Monroe County. Family Medicine residents conduct

Quality Improvement (QI) projects as part of their second-year training in practice improvement. This year, the team of **Christian Archer, MD, Madeline Bell, MD, Joel Fandel, MD, Katie Harmer, MD, and Julia Sanger, MD**, completed a project, "Improving Hypertension Management: Patient Education and Impact of Racial Bias." Their project received an award at the 2022 Highland Hospital Quality and Practice improvement Showcase.

According to **Dr. Soumya Sridhar**, outgoing Associate Medical Director, the HFM QI steering committee and HFM QI team will continue to frame our QI work with an equity lens and will encourage future resident QI projects to address the question of blood pressure goals and treatment with the aim of equitable care delivery.

EDUCATION. **Dr. Elizabeth Brown** and **Dr. Nina Piazza** have worked with other Medical Educators at University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry (URSMD) to improve the evaluation process of students, to ensure a safe, fair, and equitable learning environment across our clerkship sites, and to eradicate bias in written evaluations of students. Our URSMD Family Medicine Interest Group, under the faculty guidance of **Dr. Nina Piazza** and the student leadership of **Ms. Sabrina Sayegh**, and colleagues has been awarded the 2022 AAFP Program of Excellence Award for Collaboration as one of the top family medicine interest groups in the country.

The Family Medicine residency leadership team has addressed inequities in applicant rankings based on medical school performance evaluations and implemented a structured interview process for residency candidates. They are analyzing data about

David Holub, MD, has been named the Director of the Family Medicine Residency Program. Dr. Holub, previously served as Associate Director for the past 11 years. He succeeds **Stephen Schultz, MD**, who is stepping down after 20 years of leadership and service.

"The word *excited* is quite the understatement when describing my feelings about the opportunity to succeed Steve Schultz as the director of our residency program," said Dr. Holub. "After his 20 years of leadership and service, I have big shoes to fill for sure. The transition will be easier because I have served as the Associate Director and, more importantly, because we have an incredible team of faculty, residents, and staff."

Hallmarks of The Department of Family Medicine and its residency program continue to be commitment to community health and service to the underserved at both the main urban and the inner city FQHC residency sites as well as dedication to teaching and providing team-based care. The team has grown considerably over the past several years and now includes behavioral health clinicians, pharmacists, social workers, and nurse and community care managers. The residency program now offers 10 areas of concentration, and the curriculum includes OB training, psychosocial medicine training, and Global Health experience.

Dr. Schultz was recently honored by the department for his 20 years of service. Last year he received the Nikita J. Zervanos Award from AAFP and the Association of Family Medicine Residency Directors. "In my opinion, this is the highest award a family medicine program director can achieve in recognition of their work," said Dr. Schultz. "I LOVE being a program director, and I also realize it is a demanding job. I have decided it is time for me to step down after two decades leading the program. I am very proud of my accomplishments during my tenure, and I plan to stay on the faculty and will continue to do inpatient call and see patients."

Dr. Schultz will also be the new Director of the Global Health Pathway at the medical school, lead the residency Global Health Book Club and will precept on a regular basis. He will continue to work as a consultant for Resident Program Solutions (RPS), a consultancy service for FM residencies run by the AAFP.

An Interview with Mathew Devine, DO, President of the Monroe County Medical Society

Mathew Devine, DO, Medical Director of Highland Family Medicine and Associate Professor University of Rochester Department of Family Medicine, is the new President of the Monroe County Medical Society (MCMS). Dr. Devine previously served as Secretary and Treasurer of the organization. The following is an interview with Dr. Devine about his role at the Medical Society and his goals as president.

What inspired you to seek the presidency of the MCMS?

When my former colleague Chris Bell was executive director of the MCMS I became active in the organization. I gravitated towards it because I felt the group needed the involvement of more academic physicians. They are doing amazing work. MCMS has 15 committees, all collaborating for quality. I am enamored by the fact the group brings physicians together from different health systems offering opportunities to collaborate. Holly Russell, MD, MS, Leads Efforts for Opioid Safety for UR Medicine

Holly Ann Russell, MD, MS, founder and director of the Addiction Medicine program at Highland Family Medicine, is heading up Opioid Safety for UR Medicine, a program that will steer the Medical Center's efforts on: safer approaches to opioid prescribing; increased access and linkage to Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) treatment and improved outcomes for patients struggling with OUD.

For the last three years Dr. Russell, who is Board Certified in Addiction Medicine, has been working on how to expand access to treatment for Opioid Use Disorder within Primary Care settings including the use of telemedicine technology. Dr. Russell is the Medical Director of Clinical and Community Programs at the Center for Community Health and Prevention and the director of the Faculty Development Fellowship in the Department of Family Medicine.

"The goal of the Opioid Safety Program is to decrease morbidity and mortality from Opioid Use Disorder within UR Medicine and in our surrounding communities," said Russell. "Its underpinning is the expertise of key stakeholders across the Medical Center and the community who are involved in the prevention, identification and treatment of Opioid Use Disorder."

Russell and **Jade Malcho, MD**, assistant director, a senior clinical instructor of Emergency Medicine, are beginning with careful information gathering to understand the current practices and programs within the Medical Center as well as listening to patients and community groups to identify where the biggest opportunities for improvement exist.

"With a greater understanding of current interventions, the Opioid Safety program will link different departments working on similar projects leading to efficiencies of scale and increasing the potential reach for these programs," Russell said. "We also hope to harness the creativity and talent of those already working on this issue."

Dr. Steve Eisinger Retires After Illustrious Career

Dr. Steve Eisinger knew that he wanted to be a doctor and deliver babies since he was six years old. His dream became an illustrious career that included obstetrics, gynecology, surgery, teaching, a stint in the army, private practice, being a distinguished member of the faculty in the Department of Family Medicine at the University of Rochester, and extraordinary service at Highland Family Medicine.

Born in Michigan, Dr. Eisinger was raised in Indiana, attended the University of Chicago and went on to the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor for medical school. His plan to strictly practice OB/GYN transformed when he had the opportunity to teach OB/GYN to Family Medicine residents in the army and at the University of Wisconsin and found he loved teaching as well.

He applied across the country to Family Medicine practices, and was recruited by many, but his fate was sealed when he met Dr. Eugene Farley at Highland Family Medicine where he stayed on the faculty for 45 years.

"Dr. Farley was very charismatic and passionate about Family Medicine," said Dr. Eisinger. "I went to other interviews after I met him but found myself comparing other programs to the one in Rochester."

Dr. Eisinger embraced every opportunity. He taught residents, did research, was a founding faculty member of ALSO (Advanced Life Support for Obstetrics) and he taught the course around the world. Dr. Eisinger did extensive work in complicated deliveries and infertility and when he saw a community need for an abortion practice, he founded one.

"Steve was among the earliest OB GYN physicians to practice and teach in a FM residency program," said Colleen T. Fogarty, MD, MSc, FAAFP, Chair of the Department of Family Medicine. "His clinical acumen and teaching positively affected generations of Family Physicians, both residents and fellows. We are so grateful for his four decades of service to our department!"

Now 77 years old, Dr. Eisinger feels it's time to retire. He plans to spend more time with his wife, Sue, and is writing a memoir. Along with a friend he has a business buying and selling rare coins and stamps. Dr. Eisinger will continue to enjoy his passion of hiking, although in less challenging areas than he has hiked in Peru and Japan.
