	Get your home tested for lead (if it was built before 1978).
	Use "Lead Safe Cleaning Techniques" (see healthy housekeeping checklist)
	 Wash windows sills and floors weekly
	 "Work wet" with a spray bottle & use soap and water
	 Contact a Resource to borrow a HEPA vacuum.
	Keep children away from painted porches, windows, basements, and bare soil.
	Wash children's hands with soap and water frequently.
	Wash children's toys with soap and water frequently.
	Feed children foods rich in iron and calcium.
	Eliminate bare soil with a barrier like grass or thick mulch.
	Comply with Rochester's lead law that requires rental housing to be lead safe
	(428-LÉAD)
	Apply for a lead hazard reduction grant from the City of Rochester or
	Neighborworks.

Lead Safe Work Practices

	Take a Lead Safe Work Practices Class.
0	Contact a Resource to sign up for classes that are no-cost/low-cost.
	Keep non-workers, especially children and pregnant women, away from the work area.
	Keep the dust contained. This includes correctly using the required equipment, tools, and methods.
	 NO DRY SANDING, spray surfaces with water before sanding
	 Use a scraper to remove paint
	Enclose work area with plastic (6 mil poly) and duct tape
	Clean up with soap and water & HEPA vacuum.
	Don't bring lead dust home with you-change and wash before going home.
	 Wear the proper personal protective equipment (respirator, coveralls).
	Learn the laws about lead and obey them.
	 A copy of "Protect Your Family From Lead in Your Home"
	Call the City of Rochester to lean about the new law
