


Steuben County Response and Recovery

Overview

- On August 18, 2021 the remnants of Tropical Storm Fred struck Steuben County with a vengeance.
- The results were a Federal Disaster Declaration with Damage over \$30M not including the Jasper Troupsburg School.
- Distribution of more than \$600,000 in local recovery funds to assist local households.

Tropical Storm Fred


- The sixth tropical storm of the 2021 Atlantic hurricane season.
- Made United States landfall on August 16th in the Florida Panhandle.
- Maximum winds of 65 mph and catastrophic flooding in North Carolina.




August 18, 2021

- August 18th was a Wednesday.
- The Steuben County Fair was taking place that week and Country Music Artist Craig Morgan was performing that evening.
- Rain began in Steuben County around daybreak.
- Heavy rain began to fall during the mid afternoon.
- Rainfall rates of more than 1" per hour fell during the late afternoon/early evening hours.

Steuben County Fair






Real-time Gauge Data

Most of the rain fell during the hours of 14:00-21:00 hours basically a six hour timeframe.

- Hartsville Gauge=6.77"
- Prattsburgh Gauge=4.49"
- Cameron Gauge=3.49"



Flood Response

- At approximately 18:30 County DPW reported standing water on roadways in the southern part of the County.
- At 18:49 Jasper Fire Department was dispatch to a water problem on State Route
- Deputy Fire Coordinator responded and returned to begin evacuation of Woodhull.
- Steuben County EOC was Activated.

Flood Response

- At 19:42 the first call came in for flooding in Woodhull.
- Woodhull Fire Chief commandeered a County front end loader to begin making rescues.
- Swiftwater rescue teams could not launch boats due to the turbulence of the water.


Tuscarora Creek

- First Press Release was issued at 20:00
- State of Emergency was issued at 21:00
- At 22:30 Evacuation of the South Side of the Village of Addison was issued.
- NWS Prediction of crest over 14' with previous 13.54' in 2004.
- Red Cross Shelters were established at the Corning High School & Canisteo Fire Department.

Maximum discharge, 27,400 ft³/s, gage height, 14.28 ft



Response Summary

- At least ten people and two dogs were rescued by crews in Woodhull
- NYS OFPC swiftwater team made at least eight rescues in the Addison Area
- Unfortunately one person died in the flood when her car was swept from State Route 417 into Tuscarora creek.

Recovery

- Request for State CEDAR and DART Teams for damage assessment made at 03:15 8/19.
- Coordinated with local Code Enforcement, CEDAR and DART with the American Red Cross Damage Assessment Team.
- The next morning we established an Incident Command Post at the Woodhull Town Hall.

Recovery

- Approximately 200 homes needed inspection.
- Gas and Electric were secured to all homes that were affected.
- · Residents could not return until their electric system was inspected.



Recovery

- We established our first call with the Southern Tier/Finger Lakes COAD on Thursday afternoon.
- Began to formulate a plan on what agencies could assist and to what level.
- Identified volunteer groups to initiate short term recovery and begin clean up.

Recovery

• Residents with damages were urged to call 2-1-1 to report damages.



- Information Collected included;

 - Name Address
 - Phone Number

 - Type of Structure
 Own/Rent
 Type of Damage
 Insurance Information
 - Fair Market Value $\bullet \ \ Water \, Level/Basement$
- 2-1-1 Data Sheet had more than 350 structures listed.

Command Center

- ICP consisted of OES Staff, Deputy Fire Coordinators, NYS Forest Rangers, State Fire and Volunteer Coordinator for UMCOR.
- Establish daily assignments and checked in volunteers.
- Worked with Local Code Enforcement
- Also housed Donations Center

Volunteer Groups

- 2-1-1 collected details of damage with call back numbers.
- The ICP coordinated daily activity based upon the 2-1-1 list
- Work would be assigned to volunteer groups at the beginning of each day
- All volunteers were provided with a waiver of liability.

Volunteer Groups

- Volunteer Groups were organized and used to support clean up and muck out of local homes.
 - United Methodist Committee on Relief
 - The Mennonite Disaster Services
 - The Southern Baptists Disaster Relief
 - American Red Cross provided clean up kits, damage assessment and shelter operations.

Volunteer Groups

• Southern Baptists set up a shower trailer at the Woodhull Fire Station and supported food service for all volunteers and those needing a meal.



Debris Removal

- Established a special account at the landfill for flood debris.
- Material was separated out on site then hauled away by County and Town DPW.
- This allowed for reimbursement from FEMA



Debris Removal

- 1. Refuse-lumber, furniture, garbage
- 2. Electronics
- 3. White Goods-stoves, washers, dryers
- 4. Freon Containingrefrigerators, AC Units
- 5. Tires
- 6. Clean Wood/Tree debris

Short/Long Term Recovery

- The following Agencies stepped up help residents with their needs as part of the Steuben/Finger Lakes COAD.
 - Steuben County Department of Social Services
 - Catholic Charities of Livingston & Steuben
 - ProAction of Steuben and Yates Counties
 - Arbor Housing and Development
- All Funding was Coordinated through United Way of the Southern Tier.

Short/Long Term Recovery


- Catholic Charities established case workers at the Woodhull Town Hall to meet with victims the week following the flood.
- Coordination Calls were held once a day for the first few weeks. Then eventually weekly until all needs were met.


Short/Long Term Recovery

- United Way established a Recovery Fund.
- Funding from Corning Foundation kicked off initial recovery efforts.
- Initial funding of \$75,000 kick off the program within the first
- Other donations followed.
- In total, \$600,000 of local funds were dispensed in flood relief.

Program Funding

- Community Services Block Grant
- Weatherization Program
- Community Funding
- Community Development Block Grants
- Grant funding from State Affordable Housing Corporation
- Food Pantry of the Southern Tier
- Mission Funding
- United Way Flood Recovery Funds





Short/Long Term Recovery The County worked with NYSDHSES Recovery Division and the Individual Assistance Program to try to acquire IA from FEMA for our residents. After rejection and appeal and a second rejection we received SBA Disaster Assistance.

Short/Long Term Recovery

- SBA Disaster Loan Outreach Center (DLOC) was established January 25, 2022. (More than five months following the flood)
- SBA is a low interest loan program for eligible residents.
- Up to \$200,000 for residential property and \$40,000 for personal property.
- Interest rates of 1.5%-3% on disaster loans.

In Closing...

- The Steuben County Dispatch Center answered more than 200 calls between 6:30 pm and midnight.
- This is in addition to calling in off duty staff, calling utility companies and dispatching needed resources.

In Closing...

- The collaboration between case managers at Arbor, Catholic Charities of Steuben & Livingston, ProAction, United Way of the Southern Tier, 211, and Corning Incorporated's Community Engagement team led to extraordinary results.
- Delivered more than \$600,000 in individual family assistance when FEMA declined to help
- All committed to twice weekly calls for six months to coordinate relief
- United Way Flood Response Fund launched just six days after flooding with the first grants issued two days later
- Case managers proactively identified those with highest need for second round of UW Flood Response Funding.

In Closing...

- Currently working to establish a preexisting disaster relief fund through United Way in order to start immediate distribution of funds to victims without having to open a separate account.
- Capture the activities of August 18, 2021 for establishment of recovery efforts of future.
