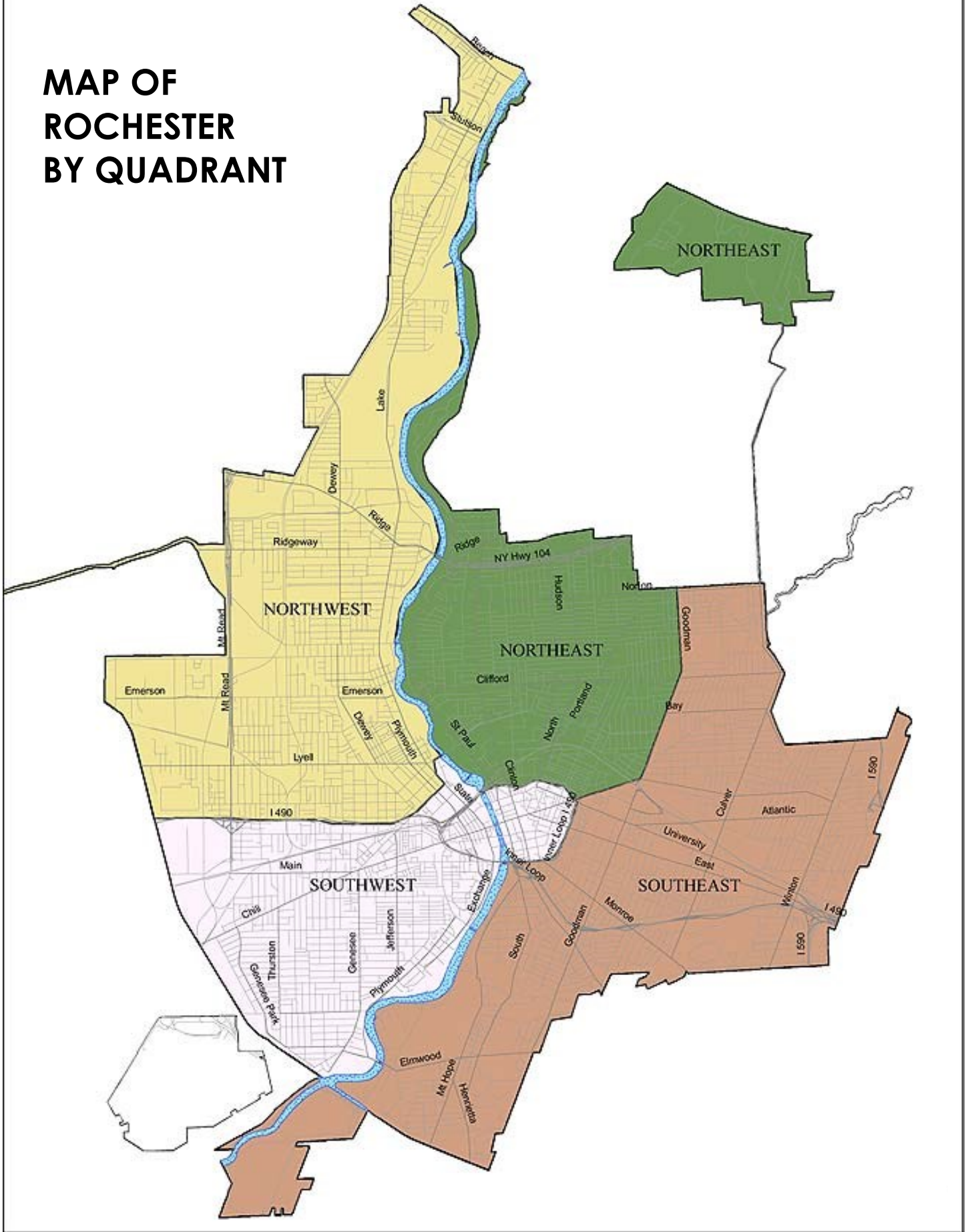

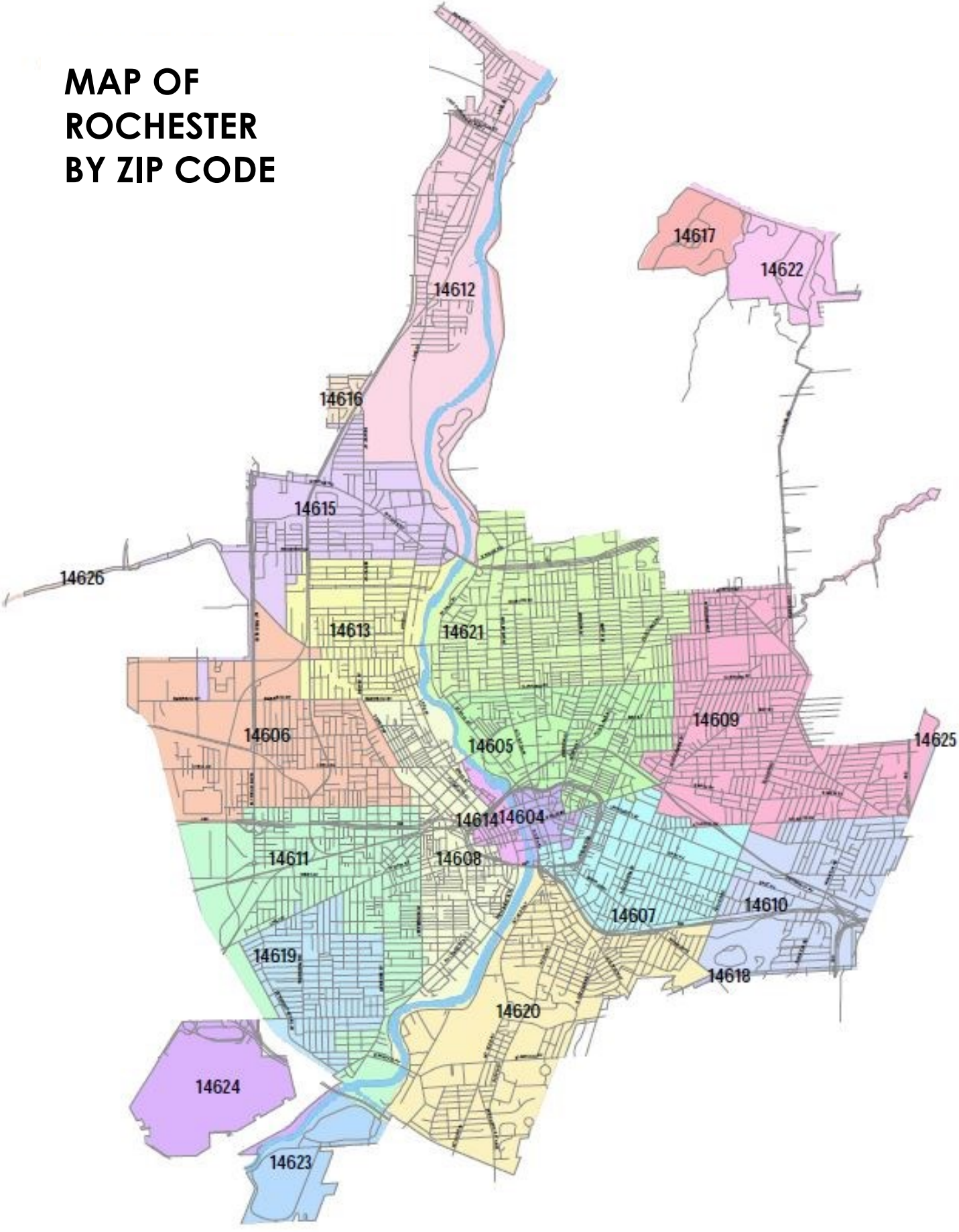

2-1-1 Life Line a program of Goodwill of the Finger Lakes

The 2-1-1/LIFE LINE program began operation in 1973 as "LIFE LINE", a crisis intervention and information & referral hotline. In January of 2005, 2-1-1 dialing access was added to our services as an easy to remember three-digit number for inquirers to access comprehensive information and referral services for our region.

The 2-1-1/LIFE LINE service region varies by contract, but our primary service area for our core services consists of Monroe, Wayne, Livingston, Ontario, Cayuga and Seneca Counties in the Finger Lakes region of New York State.

2-1-1 /LIFE LINE is a 24/7 crisis/suicide intervention program and Information & Referral (I&R) Service. We offer assistance and referrals for emergency food, shelter, clothing, crisis counseling, substance abuse issues, employment, financial and legal issues, physical and mental health needs, and more. If you need help, just ask, 24 hours a day, seven days a week, including holidays, with Spanish-speaking tele-counselors and telephone translation services available.

As a first contact for all kinds of problems, people can just **dial 2-1-1**.

911 isn't just for emergencies, and you can text to 911, too!

9-1-1

Rochester Emergency Communications Dept.

When you dial into 9-1-1:

- The signal goes to the phone company's database.
- There it finds out the information that you supply the phone company when you start service.
- Then your signal, along with the information is sent to us in the form of Automatic Name and Location information (ANI/ALI).
- Our 9-1-1 Center is now Phase II compatible with most cellular telephone companies. After ten seconds we can send a
- signal to your phone to request your GPS coordinates. With most cellular carriers we can determine your location within about 50 feet.
- When you dial 9-1-1 please stay on the line, do not hang up! Calls into 9-1-1 are taken in the order in which they are
- received. If you hang up and call back, your call goes to the last in queue which ends up being a longer wait for your call to get answered.

Non-Emergencies:

The Rochester/Monroe County 911 center is different from some other agencies because not only do we answer emergency calls, but we also answer certain non-emergency police, fire and EMS related calls.

Some non-emergency calls we take are listed below:

- Citizen needs to contact a police officer regarding an ongoing investigation.
- Citizen has concerns regarding street plowing.
- Parking problems.
- Barking or annoying dogs.
- Police reports (i.e. : violation of order of protection, telephone harassment among others)

So what do I need to know?

Head Start is a federally-funded and locally-run high quality early childhood education program for poor children, available nationwide. Action for a Better Community is the community agency that oversees Rochester's Head Start programs.

ABC Head Start

For nearly five decades, Action for a Better Community (ABC) has been a leader in encouraging, supporting, and developing self-sufficiency among low-income families in Monroe County.

As a "community action agency," ABC's programs touch upon the health, education, safety, employment, and housing of our region's families.

Head Start is a federal program.

Head Start early childhood program is a free program that serves pregnant women, and children from birth to age 5. There are several eligibility criteria, one – that enrolling families must be at or below the federal income poverty guideline – is the most important. Head Start also serves children with disabilities and at least 10% of the children enrolled will have diagnosed disabilities. Families complete an enrollment application along with proof of income and medical and dental information for their child.

After entrance, the child receives screening in health issues, vision and hearing, fine and gross motor ability, cognitive ability and behavior (all within 45 days). This information helps staff to provide a program specific to each child that enters the Head Start program. The children are provided with an individualized education plan, activities planned in all the learning domains at various levels of ability, screening in many areas – some with assistance from community programs such as pediatric links. Activities take place in the classroom, the large muscle room, on the playground and in the community by going on field trips to places such as Strong Museum, local farms, grocery stores, the library and other interesting places.

Head Start parents are part of the governing body and assist in all aspects of the program. All of the centers have parent committees. Parent education is offered throughout the year in many areas and includes health screening and information, information on child development, parenting skills and employment and educational opportunities. Each center has several curriculum events each year to showcase children's activities for their families.

Provides free eye exams and glasses to kids in need.

The Association for the Blind & Visually Impaired: Goodwill Industries of Greater Rochester, Inc.

ABVI Goodwill provides vision rehabilitation and low vision services for children, adults and seniors through unique cooperative efforts with local corporations, foundations and community agencies. ABVI's mission is "to assist people who are blind or visually impaired to achieve their highest level of independence."

ABVI-Goodwill's service area extends to nine counties, including Monroe, Wayne, Ontario, Livingston, Steuben, Yates, Seneca, Schuyler and Chemung.

ABVI-Goodwill is the only not-for-profit agency in the Greater Rochester Area that provides a full range of vision rehabilitation and employment and training services to people who are blind or visually impaired.

Daily Living Skills- Home visits and small group training help individuals learn new ways to accomplish house-hold and other tasks using adaptive equipment and methods.

Employment Services- ABVI-Goodwill provides specialized job training and employment opportunities to help people who are blind or visually impaired enter or return to the workforce.

Low Vision Center- The Low Vision Center works with consumers to maximize their remaining vision using specially prescribed lenses and visual aids.

Vision Wellness & Preventive Services:

Project Eye Care- A program designed to prevent vision problems and treatable eye disease for uninsured adults in our community. Free eye exams are provided by local eye doctors who volunteer their time. Eyeglasses are donated by partnering optical centers.

Vision Care for Kids- Free eye exams and glasses for uninsured school-age children, grades K-12.

Early Vision Screening – An effort to detect vision problems in the youngest of children when they are most treatable. Free vision screenings are provided at local child care centers and preschools for children as young as 6 months up to age five.

Al-Anon / Alateen

Al-Anon meetings are held throughout the world and in the five districts of Rochester NY, where friends and families of alcoholics come together to share their experience, strength, and hope with each other so that they may solve their common problems and recover from the effects of problem drinking.

Alateen is part of Al-Anon Family Groups. Alateen is a fellowship of young Al-Anon members, usually teenagers, whose lives have been affected by someone else's drinking. Alateen groups are sponsored by Al-Anon members who help the group to stay on track. Al-Anon meetings are held every day of the week.

Alateens come together to:

- Share experiences, strength, and hope with each other
- Discuss difficulties
- Learn effective ways to cope with problems
- Encourage one another
- Help each other understand the principles of the Al-Anon program
- Learn how to use the Twelve Steps and Alateen's Twelve Traditions

Anthony L. Jordan Health Center

The organization that became the Anthony L. Jordan Health Center, began more than 100 years ago and was one of the first five Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHC) established in the nation. Located in neighborhoods where the most pressing need exists, Jordan's roots are steeped in service to underserved and uninsured residents, meeting their need for comprehensive health services.

Anthony L. Jordan Health Center began in northeast Rochester and has since expanded to become a network of primary care offices and health centers serving residents living in three quadrants of Rochester and in Canandaigua, N.Y. Facilities include: Woodward, Brown Square, Threshold and Anthony

Services include:

Support services and job training for individuals living with physical and intellectual disabilities.

Arc of Monroe County

The Arc of Monroe County has 40 locations in Monroe County that assist individuals with intellectual and/or other developmental disabilities that include Autism, Down Syndrome, Cerebral Palsy, Asperger Syndrome, and Pervasive Developmental Disorders among others.

Ballantyne Day Services provides services to individuals with intellectual and other developmental disabilities and age related conditions including dementia. Individuals are encouraged to express themselves through nostalgic activities, gardening, exercise, music, and massage therapy. By building community experiences and developing meaningful relationships, the program further enhances each individual's sense of self.

ArcWorks is a sheltered employment program that provides vocational training and support to adults with developmental disabilities and/or intellectual challenges. We offer individuals the opportunity to learn work skills, in an industrial production setting, while performing actual sub-contract jobs for area businesses. Individuals have the opportunity to earn attendance awards and employee of the month awards. In addition, individuals are granted paid holidays and vacation pay.

ArcWorks offers a variety of programs and services in addition to vocational training. Some participants attend the DayLite Program for 90 minutes daily. In DayLite they work on improving social skills, communication skills, work habits and attitudes, community independence, etc.

Community Arts Connection is a non-traditional day habilitation service. Various art forms are used to allow individuals served to explore artistic talents, choose an art career and be trained for that path. Our current arts program includes classes in: dance/movement, music, theatre, visual arts, fiber arts, and literary arts.

CAC is for the individuals served to be seen in their community as artists. The artists at Community Arts Connection volunteer and give back to the community through socially and artistically driven opportunities.

So what do I need to know?

URMC social work program that improves outcomes for pregnant women and teens.

Baby Love

Baby Love is a community-based outreach program designed to engage at-risk pregnant women in early and continuous prenatal care.

Founded in 1988, Baby Love is an outreach program administered by URMC Strong Hospital's Social Work Division that works with health care, insurance and community providers in an effort to reduce Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) admissions, promote healthy birth outcomes, and enhance family stability.

Baby Love is a collaboration between Golisano Children's Hospital and the Rochester Early Enhancement Project (REEP) and offers a continuum of services for children from birth to age 9. The program receives its financial support from the United Way.

Services provided:

- Initial social work assessments to identify family strengths, perceived problems, available resources, and areas that require specific project focus
- Regular home visitation by paraprofessional outreach staff who focus on accessing resources, preparing mothers for child birth and parenting, enhancing daily life management skills, educating mothers on how to live healthy lives, and promoting parent/child attachment, child safety, and child development
- Development of individual and family service plans during pregnancy and the first six months of your baby's life
- Enrollment of the family, as needed, in health care, mental health and/or substance abuse treatment services
- Transportation to medical and social service appointments
- Social work intervention in situations requiring professional expertise (i.e. suicide threat, domestic violence and child abuse)
- Provision of parent education and support groups
- Referral and enrollment of family members in other community programs as needed

Supportive housing for homeless woman and their children.

Bethany House

A Catholic Worker House of Hospitality

Bethany House was founded in 1977. All of their support is through donations. The Sisters of Saint Joseph, have been connected with Bethany House for several years as volunteers and board members.

The mission of Bethany House has always been, and will continue to be, to provide food, shelter, clothing, support, advocacy, and hospitality for homeless women and children who often have been invisible and forgotten in our society.

Women are referred to Bethany House through a variety of sources and agencies throughout the community. Their primary focus is to serve the needs of homeless women 21 years of age or older with or without children.

Women live at Bethany House for a period of approximately 45 days. During this time, they search for a more permanent residence. Bethany's staff advocates on their behalf, putting them in touch with employment opportunities and social services.

Additional services:

Emergency Food Cupboard – Women in need of assistance are welcome to come to the cupboard any day of the week.

Clothing Room – offering used clothing for women and children at no cost to them.

Drop-In Services – for support, encouragement, advocacy, friendship and comfort.

Assistance in rental security deposit.

Transportation funding for emergency travel.

Camp fees for children.

Ongoing social support: Even after the women and their children have moved on from Bethany House, they retain a long-term family bond and often return for the celebration of holidays, birthdays and special events.

The recreation center is open to all youth in the Rochester Area including those developmentally disabled. The majority of children and teens fall between the ages of 6-15.

Mission:

Boys & Girls Clubs of Rochester provide youth development programs that enable young people to acquire the skills and qualities needed to become responsible citizens and leaders.

Cameron Community Ministries

Cameron Community Ministries is an Urban Outreach Community Center in the Lyell-Otis Neighborhood of Rochester, NY. Ninety-eight percent of residents in this neighborhood live in poverty.

Our mission is to provide hope to our community through emergency services, engagement, education and empowerment.

Services provided:

After School Program — The primary emphasis of the program is on homework completion, tutoring, teaching positive behavior, social and financial literacy as well as conflict resolution. We also offer snacks, field trips, arts & crafts, exercise, and many special events including exposure to places and ideas outside of Cameron's neighborhood.

Summer Safe Haven Program — offers up to eighty children a safe place to spend six weeks of their summer. The primary emphasis of the program is exposure to places and ideas outside of Cameron's neighborhood, and to bridge the learning gap between summer and fall.

DAILY SESSIONS— For 5-12 year olds Monday through Friday 10:00 am - 5:00 pm. Snack & lunch are included. **KIDS CAFE (DINNER)** - Served at 4:30 pm, available to all children under 18.

R&R Groups — R&R stands for Respect and Responsibility. Our motto is "Be strong, be confident, be fearless, and stick to your goals." At Cameron we recognized the need for a group to teach the 4th- 6th grade youth life skills, about respecting themselves and others and being responsible for themselves and others.

Hot Lunch Program — Cameron serves a free hot meal to the public six days a week, Monday-Saturday from 12 - 1:30pm. In 2015, our Hot Lunch program served over 35,000 meals to the community. The meals are filling and nutritious, with fresh fruit, vegetables and dessert items.

Emergency Food Pantry — a vital support to our community. Families are able to come in and receive food to last them for a few days until they could make ends meet. We use a model called Client Choice, which allows neighbors to choose which foods they want to take home for their families.

Clothing House — We offer a wide range of children's and adult clothing, shoes, accessories, undergarments and socks, linens, and small housewares. We also offer a supply of hygiene items, such as soap, toothpaste and shampoo for a modest fee.

Catholic Charities Family and Community Services

Catholic Family Center partners with people – especially the vulnerable and those facing poverty – to help them achieve their full human potential. Charles Settlement House is the only comprehensive human service provider centered in Northwest Rochester, offering neighborhood-based programs for approximately 3,000 children, teens, families and seniors each year. - Protects children who have been abuse or neglected.
- Provides case management services to families where children have been abused or neglected.

Child Protective Services (CPS) of Monroe County Department of Human Services

Child Protective Services is a program area of the Children and Family Services Division of the Monroe County Department of Human Services that:

1. Receives and investigates reports of suspected abuse and neglect of children;
2. Protects children who have been abused or neglected
3. Provides support and rehabilitative services to families where children have been abused or neglected.

Child Protective Services is organized into three sections:

1. Child Protective Services Intake/After Hours provides 24 hour services to the Monroe County community to investigate reports of suspected child abuse or neglect.
2. Child Protective Services Investigation investigates reports of suspected child abuse or neglect and provides immediate services to families to resolve short-term child abuse or neglect problems.
3. Child Protective Services Management Provides respectful, strength-based, and culturally competent case management and supportive services to children and their families. Safety, permanency, and well-being are the main focus of these teams, who work to support the right of each child to a lasting, safe, and nurturing environment where he or she can develop secure attachments and a sense of belonging. Some of these families have children in foster care, some have children court-placed with relatives, and others have children at home under MCDHS supervision.

At times, Child and Family Services must remove a child(ren) from their home due to immediate and/or impending danger from their legal guardian. Whenever possible, efforts are made to work with the legal guardians and parent(s) to identify known relative or non-relative caretakers to provide safe care for the child(ren) until the safety issues can be resolved. NYS requires District and voluntary authorized agency child welfare workers who notify relatives and non-relative Kinship caregivers, and prospective suitable persons of a child's removal due to maltreatment and must provide in accordance with 18-OCFS-ADM-23. 18-OCFS-ADM-23 mandates that the following informational materials be provided at such time:

Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program

The Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program provides a number of services related to reducing the incidence of lead poisoning.

- Maintains a database registry of more than 90,000 children who have been tested for elevated blood lead levels throughout Monroe County that includes all medical and environmental management information on each child.
- Provides medical case management and educational outreach to families for all children with blood lead levels $\geq 8 \mu\text{g}/\text{dl}$ (micrograms per deciliter).
- Conducts environmental investigations of primary and secondary residences of children 0-72 months of age with venous lead levels $\geq 8 \mu\text{g}/\text{dl}$. Investigations include a full educational intervention as well as the identification of conditions conducive to lead poisoning (lead hazards), issuance of a Notice and Demand to the property owner to eliminate the hazards by a specified time-frame, and reinvestigation to verify compliance.
- Provides community-wide education on lead poisoning issues to the general public, health professionals, property owners, painting contractors, parent groups, etc. This is provided in the form of formal presentations, informational kiosks throughout Monroe County, distribution of informational brochures, Health Fairs, Home Shows/Exhibitions.
- Responds to complaints of improper/unsafe lead hazard control activities and issues Cease and Desist Orders to stop unsafe practices, order cleanup of lead contamination, and assures that cleanup is performed properly.

The only program of its kind in New York State, the Crisis Nursery of Greater Rochester is dedicated to providing safe, professional and temporary care to children during family crises. Types of crises range from simple to catastrophic and are not limited to these examples:

When parents are in crisis, they can contact the Crisis Nursery or The Center for Youth's 24-hour help line. Crisis Nursery staff will assist each family based on their individual needs. Some parents need only a few hours of childcare while they resolve their issues; others may need to access the Crisis Nursery on an on-going basis until a crisis is resolved. All families receive referrals to community resources that can provide permanent assistance, as needed.

Early Intervention

Early Intervention (EI) is a voluntary developmental evaluation and services program offered by New York State and administered locally by Child and Family Health Services of the Monroe County Department of Health.

EI serves children from birth through 2 years of age and their families where there is a high risk of delay, a suspected delay in development, or a confirmed diagnosis of developmental disability.

Major provisions of the program include:

- Identification and referral of children at risk or suspected of disability by primary referral sources
- Periodic developmental screening and tracking of at risk children
- Service coordination for eligible children and families
- A multidisciplinary evaluation provided at no cost to parents to determine eligibility
- Individualized Family Service Plans (IFSPs) for eligible children and families
- Provision of early intervention services in the IFSP at no cost to parents
- Delivery of services in natural settings in the community where children of the same age are typically found, to the maximum extent appropriate

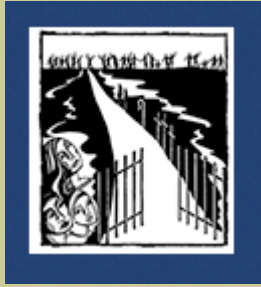

Jennifer House

Jennifer House opened in January 2002 and serves homeless women with a criminal history who are entering the community from jail, in-patient facilities, the streets and other homeless situations. This program provides a safe and structured home environment for homeless women who are age 18 or older.

Basic needs are provided for homeless women such as food, clothing, and shelter. In addition, residents receive twenty-four hour supervision, intensive case management and guidance. It also offers the opportunity for residents to become mentors for other women battling substance abuse and mental health issues. Children are reunited with their mothers in a supportive, drug-free environment, which helps to break the cycle of crime and increase community safety.

Jennifer House provides a structured residential program immediately after their release from jail. The House can accommodate 12 women and children at a time, and will provide emergency housing for a total of 50 women and children each year. Staff and volunteers facilitate access to basic and essential needs for the women being released from jail. Medical care is available for those women and children directly across the street at the Culver Medical Group.

Monroe County Children's Center

The Children's Center is a full drop-off child care center that sees over 3,500 children each year and connects parents to needed resources like healthcare, dental, housing, etc. The University of Rochester Medical Center's Department of Psychiatry oversees the operation of the Children's Center at the Monroe County Family Court.

The Children's Center, located on the third floor of the Monroe County Hall of Justice, initially only provided day care for children whose parents were in court. In taking over the Children's Center, the Medical Center's Department of Psychiatry has expanded the services to include assessment of a child's needs and an early learning program.

Families whose children attend the Center are mainly seen by Family Court, although some parents are involved in other courts as well. The Center is a viable Community/University partnership because each partner has shared and unique goals.

Staff will evaluate children to determine if they are experiencing developmental delays and then suggest appropriate referrals. If a child qualifies but is not enrolled, the new center would link the child with a Head Start program.

Many also wanted citizenship training and case management services to help with government forms written in English. By January 2012, a four-day per week program began. Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) Program

The Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) Program is a supplemental food and nutrition education program funded by the federal government. (USDA)

Four separate WIC programs serve Monroe County residents; they are the Monroe County WIC Program, Jordan Health Link, the Finger Lakes (SPCC) WIC Program and Oak Orchard Health Center. The Monroe County WIC Program has been in existence since 1978.

Services provided:

- Nutritious foods to supplement the diet. Voucher checks are issued for foods that are high in essential nutrients. The nutrients in WIC foods are critical during periods of rapid growth and development, and are essential for WIC's target population
- Information on healthful eating habits
- Breastfeeding Peer Counselor Program- trained breastfeeding peer counselors make contact by phone, and make hospital and home visits to provide education and support for breastfeeding women.
- The WIC Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (FMNP), provides additional coupons to WIC participants to purchase New York State grown fresh fruits and vegetables at participating farmers' markets.
- Referral to other community health/social services
- Basic Health Education
