Convocation 2007 Speaker

Freeman A. Hrabowski, III, PhD, widely known for his research and publications about minority participation and performance with science and math education, was the keynote speaker at the Convocation 2007 Ceremony held June 29.

Since 1992, Dr. Hrabowski has served as president of the University of Maryland, Baltimore County (UMBC). He also serves as a consultant to the National Science Foundation and the National Institutes of Health. He received the prestigious McGraw Prize in Education, the U.S. Presidential Award for Excellence in Science, Mathematics, and Engineering Mentoring, and the Columbia University Teachers College Medal for Distinguished Service. Dr. Hrabowski was named one of Fast Company magazine's "Fast 50 Champions of Innovation."

Dr. Hrabowski has co-authored two books, Beating the Odds and Overcoming the Odds focusing on parenting and high-achieving African American males and females in science. Both books are used by universities, school systems, and community groups around the country.

A child-leader in the Civil Rights Movement, Dr. Hrabowski was prominently featured in Spike Lee's 1997 documentary, Four Little Girls, based on the racially motivated bombing in 1963 of Birmingham's Sixteenth Street Baptist Church.

Born in 1950 in Birmingham, Alabama, Dr. Hrabowski graduated at 19 from Hampton Institute with highest honors in mathematics. At the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, he received his M.A. in mathematics and four years later his PhD in higher

education administration and statistics at the age of 24.

He holds honorary degrees from Princeton University,

sity, the



University of Illinois, the University of Alabama-Birmingham, Gallaudet University, Goucher College, the Medical University of South Carolina, and Binghamton University.

Dr. Hrabowski's Convocation 2007 Address

You are among the most privileged group in the world. Some of you are Americans and some of you are from other countries in the world. I want you to take a moment and savor this hour. Just take the time to feel good about being here tonight. The fact is that usually when you accomplish things, before you even know it, we are at the next level. What I'm going to be....what comes next...all the issues involving family and we rarely take the time to reflect on what it took to get here and to *appreciate this moment*.

The reason it's important to do that, although this is a good moment, every moment won't be a good moment. Your families know this and you know this. Sometimes when you take a moment and think about this special feeling...all of your family members who helped you get here, the professors who helped you, you will find that in the difficult times, today and when I'm depressed sometimes, I think about that blueberry pie and I just savor the moment. So, take this as your blueberry pie and savor it!

My second point... I want you to know your story. Each of you has a story that consists of everything that has happened in not only your life but also the things that happened to your parents and grandparents....all the things that made you who you are today. Regardless of where you are in the world, there is a story there and stories inspire...stories inspire us all. I have a sister-in-law who is a dentist in northern Virginia and we've compared stories about dentists. We live in a world in which people have two types of thoughts about dentists. Most people think in the cosmetic range and everybody talks about white teeth, but at the same time there are all kinds of health issues involved. Usually, people only think about dentists when...there is pain. Then you think about your dentist! One of the challenges we have is that people don't think prevention. I was very fortunate when I was a young boy, I had a wonderful dentist who was broadly educated, and I'll tell you what he did that was so fascinating. When I would come to his office, he would always ask me a question that would make me think about my values... my life....and my future. While he worked on me, he wanted me to be thinking about the question. And, when we finished, we'd talk a few minutes. He had an enormous impact on me because he taught me to have the patience to reflect. So, when I think about a dentist's chair, I think about reflection. It also helped me stop thinking about the pain, quite frankly...but his was a wonderful approach.

In contrast, my wife grew up in a little town in Virginia. Unfortunately, there were no dentists of color, and the one white dentist in town would only pull black children's teeth. He was not a nice man and it was an awful experience. My wife's baby sister said, "I want to have a life different than that. I want to become a dentist so I can tell all kinds of kids that they are special." She became a dentist and she loves what she does.

Those are two stories....but the story of that little girl seeing a dentist who was not nice inspired her to want to make a difference. That story inspires me because it says what's possible. Here's the point for you. You are at the top of your game. You are the leaders of this country and in the world. The challenge that we face is that too often people don't really understand the significance of your work other than when they're having some pain. The fact is, as the Surgeon General said, when you talk about craniofacial tissue, you are talking about humanity. This is the nobility of your work. When talking about speaking, smiling, kissing, crying out for pain, and protecting against microbial infections... from the biological side of things to human interaction, you have the opportunity to help people to be the best they can be as human beings. Therefore, I would challenge you, as leaders, to remember that of those to whom much is given, much is required. You are in the top 1% of the citizens of the world. If you were in undergraduate dental programs, you'd still be in the top 4-5%. But at your level now, you are in the top 1% graduating from one of the finest universities in the world...great emphasis...all of this

advanced training...and the question is this...what will you do to change the world? What will you do beyond simply making a good living?

Here's the challenge. Whether you go to an underdeveloped country or whether you are in America, you will find large numbers of poor people. One of the things that is significant about EDC is that it does reach out. The question for you is *what will you do to keep learning, growing, and developing*?

There's so much more to learn. Not so much about the science of it all but about human nature, about how you can make that difference. So my challenge here tonight is to consider the possibilities. Now is the time to ask what is possible. You're at the top of your game...you are leaders in the world, so be the best you can be. You are in the top 1% of the people in the world and have graduated from the finest University in the world. Ask yourself...what will you do to change the world...this world that contains such large numbers of poor people....what will YOU do? I challenge you to consider the possibilities. When you set off to change the world remember to enjoy your family, remember this moment, know your story, and know that you will be a leader. This is the final thing to remember ... watch your thoughts for they become your **words**. Watch your words for they become your actions. Watch your *actions* they become your habits. Watch your habits because they become your **character**. Watch your **character** for that becomes... your **destiny**.

this memory can sustain you.

I often talk about growing up in the Deep South and I work in Baltimore. I grew up in Birmingham and when people talk about the Deep South, they always talk about the importance of stories. When I grew up there were two things I loved doing...solving math problems and eating food. My mother was always trying to get me to lose weight but my grandmother loved my fat cheeks.

My grandmother would make two blueberry pies for the family, one for the family and one for Freeman. And, she would put my name on it and it would make me feel so special. My mother would be upset with my grandmother but my grandmother would just sit there watching me eat piece after piece of that blueberry pie. I can still taste that pie

Feasibility Study

Exploring the feasibility of establishing a small undergraduate dental program at the University has been halted for now. The Medical Center is involved in a strategic planning process and Dentistry will identify and prioritize additional strategies and tactics for the development of translational research and training for academic leadership. When the planning process is complete, we look forward to the opportunity of the post-merger review of UR Dentistry by an external advisory group of nationally recognized experts.

Alumni and Faculty News

It is always a delight to see our alumni and faculty garnering awards and honors because it shows that we offer one of the country's foremost academic and research environments. A number of the honors are in the research field and one of our visions for the institution is to be renown in the basic and translational research with the Center for Oral Biology. Congratulations to all our alumni and faculty for raising the bar and heightening our reputation in the research field.

Physical Plant

We recently developed a NYS HEAL proposal in conjunction with the other four New York State Dental Academic Centers (NYSDAC) that are the State's oral health safety net. EDC's portion includes a plan to redesign the atrium so we can respond to our ever-increasing patient numbers and needs. The Center was designed in the 70s to handle 30,000 to 40,000 patient visits a year. We are now providing 90,000 visits a year and the need continues to grow.

The design includes a Critical Care Center in the atrium to treat the 45-55 emergency patients who arrive on a daily basis. Because of the building's age, there are major infrastructure needs that must be met before we can begin any work on the atrium or the clinics. We'll keep you updated regarding the status of the proposal.

Alumnus Brings Hope To Talamanca

free, nongovernmental dental program has blossomed in the absence of proper health-care centers for Costa Rica's indigenous," said New York dentist and founder of Project Talamanca, Dr. Peter Aborn, Prostho '76.

Shiroles, Talamanca is in the Caribbean region and there are no oral health care options in the area. Dr. Aborn was part of a four-day care project that provided fillings and restorative work for about 250 area people.

Dr. Aborn hopes to have a fully equipped health center in the area in the next year. Patients walked five and six days to get treatment. Talamanca is an area that offers better access to sugar than toothbrushes and trips to the dentist.

In 2005, Dr. Aborn, who has a private practice and teaches at the Universidad Latina, of Panama, gathered some students and colleagues to launch a series of dental visits to the Talamanca Indigenous Reserve. He said, "We want to give the people a basic service that all people deserve."




Thank you all, for what I am now. I am a witness of myself and I have to testify what has happened to me for last three years.



The Pension Protection Act of 2006

A special opportunity for individuals who are 70 1/2 or older in 2007

The federal government has briefly opened a window that may present an option for you to make a special gift to the University that has opened doors for so many.

The Pension Protection Act of 2006

The Pension Protection Act of 2006 provides a significant opportunity for individuals over the age of 70 1/2 to make direct tax-free distributions to Dentistry at the University of Rochester from their IRAs without having to include those amounts in adjusted gross income. The transfer "counts" toward meeting the minimum required distribution for the calendar year and can be easily completed. While there is no charitable income tax deduction allowed because the gifted assets are tax deferred, many took advantage of this opportunity in 2006.

Gifts from an IRA simplified

Previously, if you wanted to use IRA funds for a charitable contribution, you had to make a taxable withdrawal from your IRA and then contribute it. The amount you withdrew was taxable, and the deduction for the contribution may or may not have offset the tax.

The new law presents a short-term opportunity to make a tax-free contribution by December 31, 2007.

Certain guidelines apply to these non-taxable charitable distributions from an IRA:

- They cannot exceed \$100,000 per year
- They must be made to a public charity (not a private foundation), and they cannot be to a supporting organization or a donor advised fund
- The gifts must be outright; for instance, they cannot be used to establish a gift annuity or fund a charitable remainder trust
- They can be used to make a gift to the Dentistry Annual Funds or to endowment
- These tax-free distributions can be made only through December 31, 2007 unless extended by Congress

You should consult your personal financial advisor about the applicability to your situation of the legal principles contained herein.



a astman Dental Center teacher and trustee, **Edward** (Bud) Wentworth, Jr., DDS, passed away in the fall of 2006 at the age of 85.

Dr. Wentworth was born in Rochester, NY in 1921. He grew up in Pittsford and graduated from Harvard University in 1943. He served in the U.S. Army in the Pacific theater for three years and received his dental degree from the University of Pennsylvania in 1950.



was part of Eastman's efforts to encourage children not to fear dentistry.

Images such as this are part of the rich history of Dentistry in Rochester that was not accessible to the public at large, until last spring, when Bibby Library at the University of Rochester's Eastman Dental Center, received a Regional Bibliographic Database Grant to digitize its historical dentistry collection. The goal of the project was to preserve existing print materials while making them more available.

Images and documents contained in the Bibby Library archives tell the story of dentistry in Rochester: the Rochester Dental Dispensary and School for Dental Hygiene, dentistry's earliest leaders in Rochester, historical dental equipment and procedures, and the Eastman dental clinics in Europe. Each of these clinics was equipped with a

enora A. Colaruotolo, social worker at Eastman Dental Center since 2004, expanded her half-time role to ensure a smooth transition of project oversight and uninterrupted provision of social work services when EDC senior social worker Maggie Petrosky resigned.

Kimberly Flint, formerly a dental assistant in pediatric dentistry, has accepted a full-time social work health project counselor position. Flint made the transition to this role with little effort given her proven history with the pediatric dental clinic staff and patient population and her background in oral health. She splits her time between a federally funded research project within the Pediatric Dentistry Clinic, another project that wasformerly funded by the New York State Department of Health, and the Dental Home for Children Project.

Julianne Briffa was the first social work graduate student intern within EDC. Briffa has been eager to learn about social work in oral health care, and has been equally interested in learning about grant writing, program development, and the implementation of services. She has already been helpful to the Dental Home for

Children Project in a number of ways including the development of a pediatric dentistry clinic brochure, the careful review of project charts, and the refinement of letters developed for communication with pediatric primary care providers.

Site Visit

In early April of 2006, the Dental Home for Children Project, which is supported by a \$250,000 Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) grant, hosted a site visit that was well-attended by a group of people at the local and state level, and by representatives of the American Academy of Pediatrics in Chicago. The site visit afforded project staff an opportunity to showcase the project and engage in meaningful discussions about the challenges of attracting and maintaining families in the dental care system. A formal presentation, a tour of the pediatric dental clinic, a brief tour of the community, and a visit to one of EDC's school-based sites were part of the visit. To capture the social context of many vulnerable families in Rochester, a project family was interviewed and videotaped within their home. This unscripted, candid home visit, which was incorporated into the formal presentation, exemplified the vast obstacles facing many poor families.

A New Sand Table

The Sponsor-a-Smile Fund, developed and launched by social work with help from the program development office, was the first attempt to raise funds that could be used at the

discretion of the social work staff to address unmet financial needs of the EDC patient population. To date, the initia tive has raised over \$2,250 and \$990 has been used to help families fill prescriptions, pay for dental care expenses not covered by Medicaid or health insurance, and obtain parking vouchers. A sand table was recently purchased for the busy pediatric waiting room, with plans to secure additional durable ageappropriate play equipment. We truly appreciate the generosity of those who have contributed, and ask you to consider the opportunity to invest in the care

FEASIBILITY UPDATE

t this time, we are stopping the exploration of the feasibility of establishing a small academically focused undergraduate program and a School of Dental Medicine at the University of Rochester (URSDM). After careful consideration of the feasibility study, Brad Berk, MD, PhD, CEO of the Medical Center, has decided that the priorities for the Medical Center including the immediate facility needs, do not allow for adequate resources or infrastructure to continue this study. Possible continuation of the study will be considered in five years. Dentistry will continue to focus on its mission and vision articulated at the time of the merger of Eastman Dental Center into the University of Rochester and restated in its 2007 Strategic Plan. In addition, as part of the Medical Center's current strategic planning process (SPF 007), Dentistry will identify and prioritize additional strategies and tactics for the development of translational research and training for academic leadership.


Further exploration of approaches to correct the post-merger anomalies, create an identity and brand for dentistry, and develop an organizational structure that allows dentistry to achieve its goals and objectives will be undertaken through discussion by Dr. Berk and dentistry's leadership. In addition, significant progress made in development efforts will continue and focus on projects that support academic leadership training and address program needs. After the strategic planning process is completed, an external advisory group of nationally recognized experts will be appointed by Dr. Berk to conduct a post-merger review of UR Dentistry. This objective review could provide a useful roadmap for UR to regain its reputation in developing academic leaders in dentistry.

Notes On A Name

Why 'Momentum?' This question has been asked repeatedly since the name was chosen. Why not something more descriptive - Alumni News or Eastman Dental Corner Newsletter, for example.

Well, we liked the sound of the word, for one thing. But 'Momentum' is more descriptive than it might appear at first glance: momentum: the force of motion acquired by a moving body as a result of the continuance of its motion.

This is, in a sense, what the Eastman Dental Center is about. Eastman is built not only of bricks and tiles, dental chairs and x-ray units, test tubes and charts, but of people people who come here and contribute something to the institution. Eastman is a bit better for having been here and they, too, have benefited from the experience. And as one man or woman leaves to move on to something new, another appears to create a place of his or her own.

Eastman is a moving body. It has been almost 60 years since the founding of the original Rochester Dental Dispensary in 1915, and the numerous changes show that this institution has not been standing still.

The name has changed twice.

The first change was to honor the institution's benefactor, who not only provided the finances but also initiated that sense of progressive movement that still exists today. George Eastman recognized a need for dental care with an understanding that is probably not found among the average layman even today, and his concern for the future of 'his' institution was often expressed by surprise visits to the clinic at 9 AM to insure that everything was being handled properly.

Many years later, in 1965, the name was again changed, this time to reflect the fact that Eastman had become a multi-purpose institution - a special Center where dental education and research stand side-by-side with patient care.

The educational programs that have become part of the Center over the past two decades have changed through the years to meet current needs. Research continues here, with the completion of one project, and its conclusions, leading to the start of another.

People who are part of these programs change too, growing as a result of their experiences.

Among those who have been the cause of change at EDC, and who have felt its effect in the resulting progress are the Center's alumni. They have been part of Eastman's momentum, and a major purpose of this publication will be to serve as a link between them and the institution they and others have helped to create.

'Momentum' is intended to be a two-way exchange, and it will reflect what we hear from you. Keep us up-to-date on your activities - promotions, appointments, opening of a new office, honors and awards, and personal information. ENHANCING ACCESS TO ORAL HEALTH FOR THE YOUNG

Infants And Children Living In Poverty In The Rochester Community Will Receive Better Dental Care Because Of A Grant Renewal.

The effects of Early Childhood Caries (ECC) may be well established by 12 months of age so the disease may cause considerable destruction to the teeth long before a preschool child is seen by a dentist or hygienist.

An early intervention program in the Strong Hospital ambulatory pediatric clinic was funded with a grant from the Dental Bureau of the New York State Department of Health since infants and children are more likely to be seen by a pediatrician or a nurse practitioner than they are by a dentist during early childhood.

The grant has been renewed for \$42,400 per year for the next five years. The renewal is based on the significant increase in the number of children treated prior to the onset of ECC during the initial funding period.

The research team involved in the grant renewal includes Drs. Ronald J. Billings, principal investigator, Neil Herendeen, Robert J. Berkowitz, and Jeffrey Karp. The team also includes Lenora A. Colaruotolo, Kimberly Flint, Mary Therese Whelehan, and Patricia Ragusa.


The program was a collaborative effort involving the faculty, staff, and residents of the University of Rochester Medical Center departments of Dentistry and pediatrics, and the Division of Social Work. The goal was to improve awareness and to increase dental referrals for children at risk of ECC.

Parents are talking with Kimberly Flint, social work health project counselor, regarding the importance of good oral health habits for their son, who is being treated in the Pediatric Dentistry Clinic.





he Eastman Dental Center Foundation Board of Directors includes individuals who have historically supported the mission and vision of the University of Rochester Medical Center and Eastman Dental Center. They are interested in promoting and supporting the mission and vision of Eastman Dental Center, and are nationally prominent in oral health education, research, and clinical care and support the mission and vision of the Center.

Several years ago, the Board began to branch out in a number of areas.

New Website

The world has gone digital, the Internet has become one of the most popular ways to communicate across the globe, and the Board is now on the electronic highway with its own Website.

I was amazed to learn that Dentistry's recruitment efforts, which used to involve sending out hundreds of packets of information, is now done via the Dentistry Website. The forms can all be downloaded and there is an extensive Q&A site designed to help prospective students with any questions they may have.

The process is easier, cost effective, and quicker, which helps increase our recruitment efforts. We had 585 applications for 58 available positions in 2007 and the numbers continue to increase.

Academic Advisory Committee

The Board appointed an Academic Advisory Committee to assist Dentistry and Medical Center leadership to maintain and improve the quality of oral health education and research. The committee will do this by an ongoing review process of Dentistry's educational programs and research activities.

The Board members appointed to the Committee include William Calnon,

The group expects to review two Eastman Dental Center programs per year, beginning with the Periodontology Program this summer. The review process will be based on a report form completed by the program director and followed by a one-day site visit review.

For each review, the program director may also suggest content experts in addition to the standing Committee, one of whom would be chosen for the review. The review is intended to

be a constructive, interactive, and non-punitive process to assist programs in their efforts to support the mission and vision of Dentistry and the University of Rochester Medical Center.


